**Background**

Under Connecticut law (Section 15-121 of the General Statutes) the Commissioner of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) has the duty to designate, and assist towns in designating, prohibited and restricted boating areas and waters limited to special boating purposes and prescribe uniform standards for the marking and regulation of such areas. Additionally, authority is given to the Commissioner to adopt regulations respecting the operation of vessels on any waterbody which lies within the territorial limits of two or more towns when petitioned by a town legislature acting in concert with its citizenry, provided certain preconditions are met (Section 15-136 of the General Statutes). This is the case here.

The former DEEP Commissioner, Daniel Esty, and his successor, Robert Klee, through a duly delegated proxy, herein consider a proposal to add Section 15-121-B15p to the Regulations of the Connecticut State Agencies to create a slow-no-wake zone in the cove of Lake Waramaug adjacent to Lake Waramaug State Park. The purpose of this regulation is to minimize user conflicts by controlling boat wakes from motorboats in an area frequented by bathers and occupants of manually-propelled vessels. This amendment is being proposed under the authority granted to the Commissioner in Section 15-121(b)(11) of the Connecticut General Statutes (CGS) and its proposal is compelled by the May 16, 2013 vote of the Town of Warren legislative body and petition of ten or more persons pursuant to CGS Section 15-136(b)(2) (Appendix A).

The proposed regulation under consideration reads as follows:

(NEW) No person shall operate a motorboat in excess of Slow-No-Wake in the cove adjacent to Lake Waramaug State Park, as measured 1750 feet from the northernmost point of the cove to a midpoint between the shores and thence defined by a line running east to west to both shores.

A Notice of Intent to Make Regulations was posted on the website of the Secretary of the State on October 1, 2013, and concurrently on the DEEP website. As announced in the Notice of Intent, a public hearing (as required under CGS Section 15-136(b)(2)) was held on November 7, 2013, in the Town of Warren. The hearing was advertised in a local newspaper. Eleanor Mariani, Boating Division Director, was designated by Commissioner Esty to hear the matter and render this opinion on behalf of his office (Appendix B). Comments regarding the matter were accepted from October 1, 2013 to January 6, 2014.

In all, comments from 69 persons were received during the comment period. Written comments are presented in full and oral comments are presented in summary in Appendix D.

In this document the DEEP considers the arguments brought for and against the proposed measure, and the Hearing Officer renders her final opinion with respect to the viability of the proposed regulation in consideration of the discussion of arguments and her independent analysis of comments received during the comment period. Readers should note that what is being decided here is whether to advance the proposed regulation or an amended version for consideration by the legislature or whether to end the initiative at this time.

### **Support for the Proposal**

During the comment period thirty-nine persons supported the proposal as written, two did not support the proposal but indicated that they might support a modified version, and twenty-eight persons opposed the proposal (see Exhibits 1-69, Appendix D). Arguments for the proposal were similar, closely following the sentiments of Mr. Dean Sarjeant (see Appendix D, Exhibit 8):

“The DEEP has proposed to adopt a boating safety regulation to create a “slow no wake” zone in the northernmost portion of the arm of the lake adjacent to Lake Waramaug State Park. I fully support this initiative because of my concern that the operation of motorboats at higher speeds (often towing water-skiers or recreational floating devices) in the limited area of this narrow arm of the lake produces major wake and wave action creating a substantial risk of danger to occupants of “people powered” vessels, such as canoes, kayaks and rowboats, as well as to sailboats and swimmers concentrated in the State Park area. As a local fire-fighter and first responder it is my belief that this is an accident waiting to happen. I live on the lake and do a lot of boating here and can tell you that due to congestion I often avoid this neck of the lake. Please consider adopting this regulation before we do it reacting to an incident.”

We believe this sufficiently captures the sentiments of the thirty-nine persons supporting this proposal, and now move to discuss the opposing arguments.

### **Opposition to the Proposal**

As stated in the previous section, twenty-eight persons opposed the proposal outright (see Exhibits 40-67, Appendix D). Arguments against the proposal were varied, and fell roughly into ten different categories, which we identify and discuss below:

1. **The proposed regulation is arbitrary.** Several opponents of this proposal have opined that the proposed regulation is arbitrary (e.g. Exhibit 40A Appendix D). The American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language defines the word “Arbitrary” as “determined by whim or caprice.” The northern portion of the state park cove is *targeted* in this proposal because swimmers and paddlecraft frequent the area and because water-skiers use the same area to make high speed turns. We note that duly authorized and trained law enforcement officers provided testimony that anticipates increasing user conflict specific to this confined area, and that this proposal is limited to approximately 5% of the lake’s surface water area. We believe that this proposal is not arbitrary and we decline to give this argument further consideration.
2. **The proposed regulation is overly restrictive; user conflict is not a 365 day occurrence.** We note that several opponents acknowledge that there *is* user conflict, but only at certain predictable high-use times. We recognize the underlying point that a regulation that is more

limited in scope might serve to reduce user conflict without unduly burdening certain user groups. We take this point into further consideration.

3. **The location of the proposed Slow-No-Wake line forces motorboats to turn in front of my property, potentially causing harm to my property and danger to my family.** This argument has merit as well. In all rulemaking it is our intent to minimize the adverse impact of any proposed regulation to all user groups, where such efforts do not negate the safety improvements we are trying to achieve. We take this point into further consideration.
4. **There have been no accidents to date.** There have been no reported accidents to date. Testimony supports frequent “near misses” and conditions of wake-induced instability (e.g. Exhibit 25A, Appendix D). In addition, the testimonies of two duly authorized and trained law enforcement officers note increasing user conflict in this area and ask for the implementation of this regulation before such accidents occur (Exhibits 35 and 36, Appendix D). We defer to the professional opinion of the two law enforcement officers, and we decline to give this argument further consideration.
5. **Restriction on this part of the lake will result in a higher density of use elsewhere in the lake, creating a dangerous situation.** Numerous persons have made this argument (e.g. Exhibit 54B, Appendix D), however, the uses in that finger of the lake and, more specifically, in the proposed slow-no-wake area that comprises about 5 percent of the lake, will continue. There will be no exclusion of any vessel types. Powerboats can use the area at slow-no-wake speed. Those vessels engaged in skiing will be required to turn sooner, but still within the finger, so the expectation for a higher density of boats in other areas of the lake is without merit.
6. **Restriction of this part of the lake will result in a higher density of use elsewhere, possibly lowering property values and creating a fiscal impact.** DEEP had not considered the property value argument in its initial fiscal impact analysis, but it has now been considered. Under Connecticut law regarding the making of regulations, municipalities are required to provide a fiscal impact analyses upon request. As stated in CGS Section 4-168, “The governing body of any municipality, if requested, shall provide the agency, within twenty working days, with any information that may be necessary for analysis in preparation of such fiscal note.” The DEEP made such a request to the towns of Washington, Warren and Kent on November 21, 2013. Only the First Selectman town of Warren responded, saying, “...I can see no fiscal impact to the Town of Warren...” (see certified letters and December 5, 2013 response, Appendix E). The question was asked and answered. The DEEP anticipates no fiscal impact, and we decline to give this argument further consideration.
7. **Allowing this restriction would open the door to additional regulation.** Pursuant to CGS Section 15-136(b)(2) (Appendix A), a vote of a local legislative body and the petition of ten or more citizens would be the impetus for DEEP to consider any additional regulations. Lake Waramaug currently has no special boat operation restrictions. The area proposed was the only one identified by local law enforcement and local users as needing restriction for speed. DEEP would oppose the outright banning of any type of vessel or the arbitrary restriction of boating rights anywhere on the lake. We respectfully decline to give this argument further consideration at this point.

8. **There is no need for this regulation, there is already a 100 or 200 foot standoff regulation for a vessel underway from another vessel underway.** No such regulation exists. While local documents suggest that there is a vessel standoff requirement (see Exhibit 41G, Appendix D), there is no such regulation. So while boaters who have read this incorrect information and operate their vessels accordingly may be safer, there can be no expectation that someone who has not read this information, and who is still operating legally, will behave in the same way. Enforcement of existing regulations has not remedied the problems identified and targeted in this proposal. We give this argument no further consideration.
9. **The fault lies with untrained canoeists and kayakers, and such vessels should be restricted to close-to-shore operation.** It is the responsibility of the DEEP to ensure that all user groups have access to the waters of the state, and that none are excluded or marginalized, subject to local safety considerations. It is every boater's responsibility to operate in a manner that is safe for themselves and for other user groups sharing the same waters. We will not consider marginalizing the rights of operators in manually propelled vessels - whether they are experienced or not - to alleviate users of motorboats from their duty to boat responsibly and prevent harm to others. We decline to give this argument any further consideration.
10. **There is no need for this regulation as it is a construct of Trooper Steve Sordi's bias.** Trooper Sordi is a trained and duly authorized Officer of the Law who is sworn to protect life and property, and who is trained to observe behavior and assess risk. We accept that his support of this measure is meant in the interest of protection of life and property and that his support is informed by his professional training and experience. We decline to give this argument any further consideration.

#### **Hearing Officer's Statement**

The north western end of the lake was identified by marine patrol officers who have jurisdiction and authority for enforcement of the entire lake (Exhibits 35 and 36, Appendix D) as an area with user conflicts and in need of regulation. No other area was identified by the officers. No other area besides the north western end of the lake was noted by First Selectman of Washington (Exhibit 1, Appendix D) or Warren (Exhibit 2, Appendix D), or by the Lake Waramaug Authority (Exhibits 5 and 10, Appendix D) as needing additional regulation. Under Connecticut law (CGS Section 7-151a) a lake authority's responsibility is to act as agent for the member towns in cooperation with the Commissioner of Energy and Environmental Protection in the enforcement of the boating laws on such water. We rely on the partnership of marine patrol and local lake authorities to understand and bring to our attention local issues.

In looking at the configuration of the lake and giving regard to comments made in support of the regulation, this narrow end of the lake was identified as a congested area with potential user conflicts from a mixed user group that includes experienced paddlers, novice paddlers, swimmers, rowing clubs/schools, operators of motorized vessels and water skiers. Marine patrol officers indicated that much of their time had to be spent in this area to ensure the safety of all user groups.

Generally, opposing groups indicated that they did not see this area as problematic, did not want to be excluded from high speed activities on any portion of the lake and had concerns that congestion would be shifted. Several commenters noted that a year round full-time restriction is an "overkill" (Exhibits 48, 49, 69, Appendix D), with one commenter noting that he skis on the lake from May through November (Exhibit 49B, Appendix D).

To assist me in making an equitable and informed decision I reviewed and considered all comments offered during the comment period; I viewed the proposed slow-no-wake area on available mapping and satellite photographs noting that the 1,750 foot line fell just north of a residential dock on the finger's east side; I contacted the State Park personnel to obtain information about the seasonality of the water uses and to pinpoint the location of the swim area and concessionaire rental; and, I reviewed the existing permit for 10 slow-no-wake buoys in front of the State Park.

Based on this information, I had concluded that a demarcation line set at 1,750 feet would cause vessels to turn in front of the residential dock, taking into consideration that that water ski tow ropes are typically approximately 75 feet in length (and not to exceed 100 feet), potentially resulting in an unnecessary impact to private property. Therefore I considered whether moving the line might accomplish the same safety goals without unnecessarily impacting private property. I conclude that changing the location of the demarcation line of the proposed slow-no-wake zone from 1,750 feet to 1,300 feet would serve several purposes. It would protect the swim area and concession area and a portion of the mooring area for the up to 13 vessels that belong to campers. It would also encourage boats at speed, and more specifically boats at speed engaged in water skiing, to turn in the widest portion of the cove, thereby potentially increasing safety for all users. Finally, it would eliminate potential impacts to private property.

Additionally, I recommend in the interest of fairness to all user groups that the restriction be in place only from May 15 to September 15 of each year, thereby accommodating waterskiing in the regulated area at the beginning and end of the water skiing season, and allowing the State Park staff time to place and remove Slow-No-Wake markers outside of holiday weekends when such activity would be disruptive to lake users and to park staff alike. While the proposed restriction would be in force whether the markers are there or not, the State Park indicated that their intent would be to have them in place by the Memorial Day weekend by the latest and to remove the markers after Labor Day weekend at the earliest.

The proposed regulation, amended in consideration of the preceding discussion, now reads as follows:

No person shall operate a motorboat on Lake Waramaug in excess of slow-no-wake from May 15 through September 15, inclusive, in the cove adjacent to Lake Waramaug State Park north of a line that is perpendicular to a line bearing 145 degrees and passing through a point that is located 1,300 feet from the northernmost reach of the cove and midway between the shores of the cove.


The amended proposed regulation and all required associated materials, amended accordingly, are included as Appendix F.

**Hearing Officer's Recommendations**

The hearing officer has reviewed comments received at the 7 November 2013 public hearing and written comments received as of 4:00 p.m. on 6 January 2014. Responses to comments germane to the proposed regulations noticed on 1 October 2014 have been addressed to my satisfaction.

Based on review of the information and the aforementioned explanations, this hearing officer recommends that the Commissioner of Energy and Environmental Protection proceed with the proposed amendment to the regulations governing the boating safety, as amended herein.

STATUTORY BASIS (CGS Section 15-136)  
NOTIFICATION OF TOWN OF WARREN VOTE &  
PETITION OF TEN OR MORE PERSONS

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## Section 15-136 of the Connecticut General Statutes

**Sec. 15-136. Ordinances and regulations.** (a) Any town, by ordinance, may make local regulations respecting the operation of vessels on any body of water within its territorial limits. Upon adoption, each such ordinance shall be submitted to the commissioner and, if not disapproved by him within sixty days thereafter, shall take effect as provided in subsection (c) of this section. The commissioner may disapprove any ordinance or part thereof which he finds to be arbitrary, unreasonable, unnecessarily restrictive, inimical to uniformity or inconsistent with the policy of this part.

(b) The commissioner may adopt regulations, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 54, respecting the operation of vessels on any body of water which lies within the territorial limits of two or more towns (1) when no local regulations exist or (2) when such action is required to establish uniformity in the boating regulations of the several towns. Any town, by vote of its legislative body, and any group of ten or more interested persons may petition the commissioner for the adoption, amendment or repeal of the regulations. The commissioner shall hold a public hearing on each such petition in the petitioning town or in one of the towns which will be affected, giving all interested persons an opportunity to present their views. Notice of such hearing, stating the date, time and place thereof and the substance of the proposed regulation, shall be published at least ten days prior thereto in a newspaper of general circulation in the town or towns which will be affected.

(c) All regulations adopted pursuant to the provisions of this section shall take effect upon their publication and posting as required by section 15-138.

Dear Commissioner Esty:

At its meeting duly held on May 16, 2013, the Town Meeting of the Town of Warren, Connecticut, being the legislative body of the Town, adopted the following resolution by vote of the meeting:

"To request that the Commissioner of the State Department of Energy and Environmental Protection adopt a regulation establishing a "Slow-No-Wake" In the cove adjacent to Lake Waramaug State Park, as measured 1750 feet from the northernmost point of the cove to a midpoint between the shores and thence defined by a line running east and west to both shores. The definition of "Slow-No-Wake" as defined in Regulations of the Connecticut State Agencies Section 15-121-A1, as amended, is hereby incorporated by Reference."

This resolution is intended by the Town Meeting to constitute the petition for adoption of a regulation contemplated by Section 15-136(b) CGS. Lake Waramaug lies within the territorial limits of three towns: Warren, Washington and Kent (the "Lake Towns"). No local regulation on this subject exists in any of the Lake Towns. Accordingly, under the statute, the Commissioner may adopt a regulation of the type requested respecting the operation of vessels on Lake Waramaug.


We are enclosing the following in support of this petition:

**STATEMENT OF LAKE WARAMAUG AUTHORITY  
IN SUPPORT OF ESTABLISHMENT OF A SLOW-NO-WAKE ZONE  
IN A PORTION OF LAKE WARAMAUG**

We are writing on behalf of the Lake Waramaug Authority concerning a serious water safety problem which has become a matter of concern to us and to propose regulatory action which we believe would be helpful in substantially reducing the danger and risk to users of the lake. The Lake Waramaug Authority was established pursuant to State statute by ordinances of the Towns of Warren, Washington and Kent to act as agent of the towns in connection with the enforcement of State boating laws.

**The problem.** As you know, Lake Waramaug is a popular destination for engaging in a broad variety of marine activities, ranging from swimming and the operation of small "people-powered" vessels (canoes, kayaks, rowing sculls, and the like) and sailboats to large motor boats, many towing water-skiers and tubers. These varied uses are particularly concentrated together in the northern portion of the narrow arm of the lake in which Lake Waramaug State Park is located.

Over the past five years, we have witnessed a marked increase in this arm of the lake in the number of people-powered small vessels being launched from the State Park by campers and park visitors. The State Park's canoe and kayak concession has been busy, and more than ever day-trippers and campers are carrying in their own small paddle-type vessels. At the same time, motor boat and water-skiing activity has also increased. Such activity creates substantial wakes and wave action which puts the operators of the small people-powered vessels at significant risk. This increased use has heightened our concern over the conflict between casual paddle boaters and motor boats moving through this narrow arm of the lake.

Times of highest conflict and risk are, of course, during busy summer days. Especially during these times we have witnessed several close call run-ins between motor boats and small craft. It is clear that many of the paddle-type boaters at Lake Waramaug are inexperienced and can be caught off-guard with first encounters with motor boat wave action.

**Initial response.** In response to these concerns, the Lake Waramaug Authority's marine patrol has increased its surveillance of this arm of the lake enforcing boating regulations. While this has helped, the Authority has limited patrol time and resources and cannot be stationed at all times during busy boating days at the State Park arm of the lake.

**Proposed action to promote safety in the northern portion of the State Park arm of the lake.** Waramaug is an attractive lake, a "jewel in the crown" of Northwest Connecticut, with a beautiful State Park designed for carry-on boating of people-powered vessels.

Accordingly, we expect this motor boat – paddle boat conflict to continue and increase in the coming years.

To promote safety of all users of this portion of the narrow and busy arm of the lake, and based upon our familiarity with the lake and its boating patterns, we recommend that:

**a “Slow-No-Wake” zone be established covering that portion of the State Park arm of the lake measured from the northern tip (adjacent to North Shore Road in Warren) and running shore-to-shore 1,750 feet south measured along the lake centerline.**

This delineation provides an ample safe zone for paddle boaters to enjoy while still providing motor boat access to the remaining portion of the State Park lakefront and the balance of this arm of the lake, as well as the rest of the lake. It would also reduce risk to swimmers who swim outside of the roped State Park swim area. An aerial photograph of the lake, marked to show the affected area, is attached.

Lake Waramaug was designated in 2000 as the State’s first Heritage Lake under the 1999 Heritage Lake Act. We believe that the designation of the requested Slow-No-Wake zone will further the safe and balanced recreational use of Lake Waramaug consistent with the policy of the Heritage Lake Act for cooperation between the State and the lake towns “to promote and encourage public use and enjoyment” of the lake and to “protect and preserve [its] character”.

P.S. An environmental benefit of the “Slow-No-Wake” zone is that it will protect against further erosion along the State Park shoreline. That area is subject to erosion from wave action because there is little rooted vegetation on the closely-mowed, heavily used shoreline. In the mid-80s, a State funded renovation was completed involving regrading of the shoreline slopes and the imbedding of honeycombed concrete blocks which were backfilled with soil and seeded to stabilize the shoreline. While that work requires longer term renewal, reduction of motor boat wave action will have an immediate beneficial effect.



PETITION TO THE COMMISSIONER OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION:

To promote the safety of *all* users within the narrow and busy cove of Lake Waramaug adjacent to the Lake Waramaug State Park, we the undersigned hereby endorse the recommendation of the Lake Waramaug Authority that a Slow-No-Wake boating zone be established therein and petition the Commissioner of the State Department of Energy and Environmental Protection to adopt a regulation establishing such zone as follows, with such changes therein as the Commissioner may deem appropriate:

*"Slow-No-Wake in the cove adjacent to Lake Waramaug State Park, as measured 1750 feet from the northernmost point of the cove to a midpoint between the shores and thence defined by a line running east and west to both shores. The definition of "Slow-No-Wake" as defined in Regulations of the Connecticut State Agencies Section 15-121-A1, as amended, is hereby incorporated by reference."*

The Lake Waramaug Authority by its charter has the responsibility to enforce the State of Connecticut boating laws in cooperation with the Commissioner of the State Department of Energy and Environmental Protection ("DEEP"). All water related activities fall under the jurisdiction of the Lake Waramaug Authority and its Marine Patrol to ensure the safety and enjoyment of all recreational users of the lake.

The DEEP has proposed to adopt a boating safety regulation to create a "slow no wake" zone in the northernmost portion of the arm of the lake adjacent to Lake Waramaug State Park. The Lake Waramaug Authority initiated the petition to the DEEP to consider the adoption of such regulation because of our concern that the operation of motorboats at higher speeds (often towing water-skiers or recreational floating devices) in the limited area of this narrow arm of the lake produces major wake and wave action creating a substantial risk of danger to occupants of "people powered" vessels, such as canoes, kayaks and rowboats, as well as to sailboats and swimmers concentrated in the State Park area. Over the past five years, the Marine Patrol has observed a marked increase in all categories of users in this small area of the lake and has witnessed several close call run-ins between motorboats and small crafts.

I would like to put a positive word in favor of the DEEP proposed Slow No Wake zone at the North Cove opposite the State Park. This zone is needed for the safety of swimmers and human powered boats on the lake that are regularly menaced by high speed motor boats, especially water skiers.

We are fortunate not to have already had serious motor boat accidents on the lake. Before long, we can expect to see a motor boat overrunning a lake swimmer or slow moving paddle boat with the possible loss of human life. A SNW regulation would help avoid such a tragedy as it would provide a place for swimming which is safe from motor boats.

I row on this lake nearly every day from April to November and swim in the lake nearly every day in the now lengthening summer. In fact, I know of no person who makes more regular use of Lake Waramaug than do I.

In my judgment, a SNW zone is over due and should be promulgated (with suitable buoy signage) as soon as possible before the approaching Spring. Thank you for your consideration.

I am writing to you in support of the proposed boating safety regulation establishing a Slow No Wake zone in the northernmost portion of the State Park cove of Lake Waramaug.

I am President of The Lake Waramaug Association, the Board of Directors of which supports the proposed regulation, but I write as an individual user of the lake and owner of a home on the lake for almost forty years.

I believe that the Lake Waramaug Authority and its Marine Patrol are correct in their concern that there is a serious water safety problem in the small area proposed to be regulated due to the concentration of various uses there. One finds in that area canoers, kayakers, sailboats, rowboats, small and large motorboats, water skiers, tubers and swimmers outside of the marked swimming area. As motor boats have increased in size and power over the years, wake and wave action has become more evident and dangerous to those operating "people powered " craft there.

We are fortunate that the lake, as a public recreation area, attracts all these varied constituencies of users to its waters. But this brings with it an obligation to assure the safety of *all* users, to the greatest extent possible. The proposed regulation meets that obligation in this heavily used area.

I know that some operators of motor boats believe that this area of the lake is particularly inviting for water skiing and that they should not be deprived of its use for such purpose. But it is also utilized heavily by renters of small craft, by those launching their own "car top" boats at the State Park launch site, by rowers and paddlers from other parts of the lake and by swimmers. I understand that the proposed zone covers approximately 31 acres, or only about 4.5% of the surface of the 680 acre lake, leaving the remainder of the State Park cove and all of the rest of the lake available without specific restriction other than those generally applicable in statewide boating rules.

Any regulation involves a reasonable balancing of competing interests. Here the guiding principles must be **assuring the balanced recreational use of the lake and the safety of all those enjoying its waters**. I believe that the proposed regulation supports these goals, is in the public interest, and should be adopted.

As a very frequent user of Lake Waramaug as a bass angler and user of the public boat launch on the lake, I write in support of the proposed slow no wake zone as long as such zone is restricted to the northern most portion of the cove by the Lake Waramaug State Park only. The no wake zone should not extend further southward beyond the state park and further into the main lake.

The western side of this cove area has already been designated a No Wake area and No Wake buoys are in place there during the open season. I assume this current proposal would extend the slow no wake area from its western shore over to its eastern shore. Again, I would support this measure but I would not support any measure to further impose additional speed limits or no wake zones beyond this designated area. The other swim areas on the lake are clearly roped off and marked. As a operator of a high end bass boat, I always idle down in areas where a I can see kayakers paddling in the area. I always attempt not to wake any small vessel, canoeist, kayaker, swimmer or boarder throughout the lake. I assume this is normal boater etiquette.

I have witnessed, on a number of occasions, pleasure boaters entering and exiting the state park cove area on full plane. This action would certainly wake the state park shoreline and any kayakers in the cove. Most times though, boats will idle down if kayakers are seen in the cove. If a person who rents a kayak at the state park is not an experienced kayaker (as many most likely are not) and decides to enter into other sections of the lake they should be forewarned they most likely will encounter boat wake action.

As an additional safety measure, encompassing the state park cove area as slow no wake would have my support and as an officer of the Connecticut Bass Anglers Sportsmen Society Nation, I believe I speak for any responsible tournament bass angler.

Dear Mr. Delgado –

I am writing to you regarding the “Slow-No-Wake” zone being proposed for the northern portion of Lake Waramaug adjacent to the state park. I have been a homeowner on the lake since 2007. My wife and I and our four young children (ages 5-9) are active swimmers, boaters and kayakers in and on the waters of this unique and wonderful lake. We are also active supporters of the various state- and privately funded entities and initiatives that promote the welfare of the lake itself and the safety, welfare, and enjoyment of its many users.

While we support efforts seeking to improve boater safety generally, we are opposed to the adoption of the proposed “Slow-No-Wake” zone. The evidence does not suggest that there is currently a safety “problem” on the lake. We all share an ongoing duty to ensure safety on the lake, but the lake has achieved an excellent record of safety and it is not at all clear that we have a problem. In addition, we believe there are potential negative consequences from this proposal that may not have been fully considered and that this proposal may actually *increase* the risk of serious incident elsewhere on the lake. And finally, we believe there are appropriate and effective laws and rules currently in place, and many additional common-sense initiatives for improving safety for kayakers, canoers and users of other personal watercraft that should be further implemented or enforced before adoption of such a restrictive and dramatic measure by DEEP is even considered.

#### **An Exemplary Record of Safety on the Lake**

Through a combination of vigilant and effective law enforcement, sensible restrictions on motorboat access to the lake, boater training and licensing, and respectful, common-sense operation by users of watercraft of all types, Lake Waramaug has enjoyed an excellent record of safety over the years. In fact, neither we nor any of the numerous lake residents we have surveyed are aware of any significant injury or incident resulting from personal watercraft colliding with a motorboat on our lake or from other “user conflicts”. Through additional research and review of public records, we have been unable to discover a single such incident. Lake law enforcement officers and all conscientious Lake Waramaug boaters should be applauded for this record. Of course we must all remain vigilant to protect against

future incident, but this record does not indicate a problem with boater safety or collisions between motorboats and other watercraft on Lake Waramaug.

### **Increased Risk of Incident Outside the Proposed "Slow-No-Wake" Zone**

There are risks inherent to all types of boating and additional risks associated with multiple operators of various vessels sharing any body of water. Restricting motorboat or water-skier access from a portion of the lake will not eliminate these risks and may actually increase the likelihood of collision or incident elsewhere. For a given number of motorboats on the lake, the proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone will result in more concentrated high-speed traffic and motorboat density elsewhere. This is simple and undeniable math. If a motorboat is unable to travel at speed in one area, it will do so in another.

The stated purpose of the proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone is "for the purpose of minimizing user conflicts by controlling boat wakes from powerboats in an area frequented by bathers and occupants of manually-propelled vessels." This is a noble aim, but the state park represents only one of many such areas on the lake. In fact, our four young children often swim and kayak in the waters near our house through which skiers and motorboats often travel at high speeds followed by large wakes. Most homeowners on the lake also own kayaks, canoes, or other personal watercraft. Children and adults use these vessels to traverse the entirety of the lake in a wide range of traffic patterns. Many others swim these or similar routes. There are at least two town beaches and two private beaches where swimmers and users of personal watercraft gather in large numbers at times, including one club just south of the proposed restricted area. Are we soon to prohibit motorboats from those waters as well? Should users of personal watercraft be limited to using only "slow-no-wake" zones? Of course not. Such restrictions would make the lake safer, but they would also diminish the lake experience for all users.

Lake Waramaug is a shared resource that should remain open to all approved vessels operating appropriately under established laws and regulations. Unfortunately, boating of any type and lake use generally exposes one to inherent risks. But these risks are lake-wide and not limited to any single area. ***So why is DEEP considering providing protection for one area and group of lake users with a new policy and restriction that will increase the risk of incident to residents and other lake users elsewhere?***

### **Existing Laws and Lake Regulations are Adequate and Effective**

Fortunately for all users of the lake, there are currently many laws and regulations in effect that reduce these risks and that have contributed to the excellent record of safety that the lake and its users have enjoyed. While considering the adoption of this specific proposal, or any new initiative, let's first be sure we're taking full advantage of the rules and resources that are already in place.

The Lake Waramaug Association website [www.waramaugassoc.org](http://www.waramaugassoc.org) is an invaluable resource that all visitors to the lake, especially short-term visitors at the state park, should review extensively. In addition to many useful items of information about the lake generally, safe boating regulations (including speed restrictions for motorboats within 200' of personal watercraft, shore, docks, etc.) are spelled out clearly. There are also reminders for all boaters to look for, and maintain safe distances

from, swimmers who may be difficult to see and a number of other practical, common-sense suggestions to maximize enjoyment and safety while visiting the lake (pls see attached Exhibit A).

Observance and enforcement of these laws and regulations will help achieve the stated safety objective of the proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone in the future, just as they have in years past. Motorboats are not allowed under current law to travel at high speeds within 200' of a kayak, canoe, or other personal watercraft. If the state park is crowded on a given day and many visitors are kayaking or canoeing in the area of concern (such as during peak hours on July 4 or Labor Day holiday weekends), motorboats and skiers will not (and should not) be able to travel at high speeds in this area without violating existing laws. But if the state park is not busy and few or even no personal watercraft are on the water in the area (which is most often the case), there should be no restrictions on motorboat speeds in this area other than existing regulations and the already-established and ample designated swimming area at the state park. Greater knowledge of these rules and adherence to both their letter and spirit will help ensure a continued strong record of safety on the lake. Are these rules provided to visitors to the state park or posted at the town boat ramp? If not, they should be. And of course, continued enforcement of these laws and regulations by our lake's highly professional and effective law enforcement officers will help.

#### **All Boaters Must Share Responsibility for Safety**

Users of personal water craft, especially inexperienced users, must also share in the duty and responsibility for safe boating. CT offers numerous boater safety classes, including classes specifically addressing the operation of kayaks and canoes. These are available under DEEP's own website (though there are no such classes currently scheduled - see attached Exhibit B). These are not currently required courses, but perhaps they should be considered as requirements or at least more actively encouraged for all personal watercraft users, especially less-experienced users and children who are occasional visitors to the lake.

In addition to these sources and the instruction and tips provided, the following are additional suggestions or experience-based practices that we recommend and use to help ensure the safety of our family and friends when using personal watercraft:

- Use only brightly colored kayaks, canoes or other watercraft. Our family uses only yellow, orange and red, which are the most visible. Blue, green and brown vessels are more difficult to see, especially in poor light. On darker colored vessels, reflector tape or other bright markings can and should be added to increase visibility.
- Use only bright yellow paddles. These can be seen from afar, especially when the user is paddling actively.
- Wear brightly colored life jackets – again, red, yellow, orange are the most visible colors.
- Try to stay in shallow water near the shore until the user is more experienced. Motorboats require deeper water and are restricted by law from traveling at high speeds within 200' of shore.


- Try to stay in groups, especially when paddling in open, deeper water. Larger groups are easier for other boaters to see and there is generally safety in numbers.
- If the sun is low, bright, and behind you, it will be in the eyes of oncoming boaters. Be very careful to identify and avoid oncoming boats under these conditions.
- Pay attention and stay alert! Boating is fun, but it can also be dangerous!

None of these suggestions or practices alone or even all of them taken together will ensure 100% safety for all users of personal watercraft or motorboats. But combined with continued vigilance of motorboat operators, enforcement of existing laws and regulations, and some amount of good fortune, they will help us achieve a continuing record of exemplary safety on the lake.

In closing, we would like to thank DEEP for its careful consideration of this issue. We would also like to thank the various lake-focused entities and supporters and law enforcement professionals that have helped make Lake Waramaug a beautiful, safe, and enjoyable lake for my family and all lake users. We look forward to many more safe and fun years here with all of our neighbors and other lake visitors. And finally, we would like to acknowledge and applaud the sincere intent of the advocates of the proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone. We are all served well by sensible initiatives for greater safety on the lake and we should all share in the responsibility to ensure the welfare of all boaters and other users of the lake.

However, we can't support this specific proposal due to the increased disturbance and risk of injury it will bring to the lake waters near our house and other areas of the lake beyond the waters of the state park where our children and others swim, kayak, canoe, etc. If continued safety for *all* users of the lake is the aim (and it should be), let's achieve it through continued vigilance and enforcement of existing laws and regulations, or initiatives which are necessary, balanced, fair to *all* lake users and property owners, and effective in adding to the safety of *all* lake users. The proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone would be none of these things.



All other motorboats, including jet skis, must be launched from Washington Boat ramp, which incorporates an inspection for dangerous plants or other material with each launch. The ramp is located on Route 45 near the Washington town beach at the southeast corner of the Lake.

**Safe Boating**

All Boaters must follow Connecticut laws and regulations. Boating information can be found in the **Connecticut Boater's Guide** which is also available from the Town Clerk. A "Safe Boating Certificate" is required in order to operate a motorized recreational vessel and must be on board at all times during operation. In order to obtain a Safe Boating Certificate, an individual must successfully complete an approved basic boating course or receive a passing grade on an equivalency examination administered by the DEP. Similar requirements exist for operating a Personal Watercraft (i.e. Jetski). **Certification and registration** information can be found on the CT Department of Environmental Protection website.



Connecticut law requires that all boats with motors — regardless of size — and sailboats powered by sail alone, 19 1/2 feet or longer, be registered and numbered before launching. If you purchase a boat that is currently registered, you are responsible for seeing that it is registered in your name. All vessels must be registered with the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV). Evidence of ownership must be submitted at the time of registration. Upon receipt of the application and fee, an identification number will be assigned and a certificate of number/registration will be issued along with two validation decals. The registration will be valid until April 30 of the following year. Connecticut vessel numbers stay with the boat as long as it is registered in the state. Normally you will receive a registration renewal from DMV early in the calendar year. If you do not register the boat for a year, you will not receive another renewal notice and you must go to a DMV office to renew your registration.

Please practice safe and courteous boating. Connecticut boating regulations include:

- \* • Operation of a vessel at a speed in excess of "slow-no-wake" speed is illegal within 100 feet of a boat, and 200 feet of personal watercraft, shore, docks, floats or moored or anchored vessels.
- Operate vessel only at minimum speed necessary to maintain steerage when within 100 feet of a marked swimming area.
- Ensure you have a Personal Flotation Device (PFD) of the appropriate size for **every** person on board; and every child under 12 is wearing a PFD.
- \* • A spotter, who is at least 12 years old, is required when towing waterskiers, tubes, wakeboards, etc.
- \* • To maximize enjoyment of the Lake for everyone please be aware of swimmers, kayakers, canoers and rowers and try to maintain distance and minimize your wake which may destabilize them.
- \* • Be aware of swimmers far from shore who may be difficult to see.
- Minimize noise on the Lake in the early morning and at night.
- Violators may be fined.

**SWIMMING AND LAKESIDE BEACHES**

- \* Swimmers should remain close to shore and in marked swimming areas. **IT CAN BE VERY DIFFICULT FOR MOTOR BOATS TO SPOT SWIMMERS.** If you plan to swim further from shore, have a spotter boat accompany you to divert other watercraft.

Access to the Lake is available at the Lake Waramaug State Park at the northwest end of the Lake, and, for residents of Warren and Washington with the appropriate permits, at their respective Town Beaches. These locations provide opportunities for swimming, picnics, non-motorized boating.

**Warren Town Beach**

The beach is open Memorial Day through Labor Day, 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. to Warren residents, taxpayers, and their guests. Vehicles owned or leased by property owners or renters are eligible for beach stickers which

Esteemed Ladies and Gentlemen -

For those of you I haven't met or spoken with previously, my name is John Lancaster and I am a resident of 244 West Shore Rd. located on the southwestern shore of Lake Waramaug in New Preston, CT. I am strongly against the proposed "Slow-No-Wake Zone" for many reasons.

I have attached a copy of my original submission to Tim Delgado of DEEP sent in October. This letter outlines many of my specific concerns in some detail and it also goes on to suggest many sensible proposals for continuing and further ensuring the outstanding record of safety that users and residents of Lake Waramaug has enjoyed. In summary, my views as further laid out in this letter are as follows:

- The lake is already a very safe body of water with an outstanding record of safety. While the pursuit of greater safety is ever important, any permanent restriction such as this one should be considered only where there is a clear and critical need. There is already a large and well defined swimming area at the park and there has not been a single incident on record of powerboats colliding with either swimmers or personal watercraft.

- Existing state boating laws and regulations are adequate, sensible and effective. In fact, the impressive safety record of the lake is largely due to these rules and regulations and the constant and effective police presence we enjoy on the lake. Our lake law enforcement officers do a great job, but many users of the lake could be more informed of the applicable laws and regulations and greater observance and enforcement of these laws and regulations should be considered before such a permanent restriction is placed on an already small but safe lake.

- On the busiest days of the year when boat traffic is highest, this proposed zone will actually make the majority of the lake MORE DANGEROUS. It's simple math: if motorboats are no longer able to travel in high speeds in the proposed restricted zone, they will do so elsewhere on the lake.

- My children and many others swim and kayak on all areas of the lake. This proposal seeks to protect only the users in a limited area near the state park and may actually increase the chances of incident elsewhere. Why should the users of the Washington Town beach, Warren Town Beach and the lake clubs where many children and adults gather to swim or paddle, be less protected than users of the state park?

- Sensible boater training and common-sense practices should be adopted and further emphasized before a restriction such as this impacts the lake forever. As I describe in my original letter, my children use only bright yellow or red kayaks and bright yellow paddles that can be seen clearly from other boats at even long distances. Simple reflector tape can be added to other color kayaks. Boats of all types can co-exist safely on all parts of the lake as they have for years as long as rules are followed and people act sensibly and respectfully to the lake and other users.

Since writing this initial letter, I have reached out to many of you and other State officials. I have also spoken or exchanged emails with many concerned residents and users of the lake. Although awareness of this issue was quite limited initially, it has clearly received increasing attention in recent weeks from both residents and elected officials.

I understand that many of you will be meeting with Susan Whelan and other of the DEEP as a group sometime in the next few weeks to discuss this. I applaud this collective effort and appreciate the time you are all giving to this important matter. Lake Waramaug is a wonderful body of water that is a shared resource of all three lake towns and the broader State of Ct. Thankfully, it has been a very safe body of water due to the observance and enforcement of existing laws and regulations, combined with sensible, respectful boating practices of lake residents and other visitors. Please choose to reject this proposed "Slow- No-Wake Zone". It is unnecessary and it carries with it many negative unforeseen consequences. This ENTIRE lake should be open to and shared by ALL users as long as they respect and adhere to appropriate and existing laws and regulations and use common-sense and respectful practice when boating, kayaking, or swimming.

Thank you very much for your time and consideration of this matter. I would be happy to speak with any of you further if you have any questions or comments and I wish you well in your deliberations and for a happy and healthy 2014!

To Whom It May Concern:

In response to the recent proposal to impose a slow no-wake zone at the northern section of the Arrow Point cove / State Park on Lake Waramaug (also referred to as the Lake), I must express my disapproval. As a long time resident of the area in question, the first on Arrow Point Road in fact, I strongly disagree with the assessments of the Lake Waramaug Association (from this point on, referred to as the LWA) in this matter.

Being that I have been a resident on this lake since the 1970's and am an avid water sports participant, I can attest to the fact that the boat traffic on this lake is lower than on most inland water bodies in the state and that the boat traffic poses a minimal threat to non-powered vessels. Contrary to what the LWA has cited as an increase in boating traffic and risk of accidents, the overall boating traffic has actually decreased significantly due to the severely restricted use imposed by the LWA in recent years; their recently adopted regulations that allow for only a maximum of 7 day use passes, and a maximum of 12 passes for those camping at the state park. These 19 boaters in addition to those who reside on the lake means that the lake does not suffer from the heavy traffic as perceived by those members of the LWA. Case in point – the number of boaters using the Housatonic River / Lake Zoar on any given day easily outnumber those on Lake Waramaug. Due to Lake Zoar being an extremely narrow waterway, there is a significantly higher risk to non-powered vessels operated by novice and experienced persons alike from Kettletown State Park, Jacksons Cove and the numerous other areas along that waterway even on its slowest days than Lake Waramaug will ever experience even on its heaviest use day.

In addition to the LWA's exaggeration of the risk to non-powered vessels, I feel that this additional regulation, in conjunction with the other various and numerous regulations that have been imposed on the Lake over the years, will severely restrict overall enjoyment of the lake and will have an extremely adverse impact on my property values. I cannot support a regulation that will have a highly negative impact on my property use, values and marketability as my waterfront will likely fall within this proposed no wake zone and be directly affected by this proposal based on the information I have seen.

I view this proposal as unnecessary and in my opinion, just a way for the LWA to further restrict the use of the Lake. The only beneficiary to this proposal is a private business entity that operates out of the State Park for profit. I am of the opinion that if this proposal passes, others will then seek to expand the no wake zone and eventually seek ban all motorized vessels.

Don't let yourself be duped.

The real purpose of the Slow No Wake Zone proposed for Lake Waramaug (Section 15-121-B15p) is to push motor boats and jet skis away from the property of David Robinson, a wealthy board member of the Lake Waramaug Task Force and, I believe, a former board member of the Lake Waramaug Authority. He owns about 90% of the Warren shoreline that would directly benefit from the new rule. The jet skis that moor at the state park are a loud unwelcome presence in that cove. I know. I live in the same cove. I wish I had the political firepower to get them banned from in front of my house.

The "stated" purpose of the regulation is laudable -- "Minimizing user conflicts by controlling boat wakes from power boats in an area frequented by bathers and occupants of manually propelled vessels." That is a long way of saying that we want to keep swimmers and kayakers safe from motor boats. No one would argue against this goal which is a worthy aim for the entire lake and....every body of water on the planet.

The area where jet skis and other motor boats would be banned does indeed get crowded on a few summer weekends each year for perhaps 4 to 5 hours on those days. The total number of crowded days per year is roughly 6 to 8. The means there are about 30-40 hours a YEAR when lake users would benefit from the proposed regulation. But, the regulation, as written, would ban motor boats in that cove for 8760 hours a year (every day all day). This is insane overkill. It is almost comical. It is so grossly over-the-top relative to the size of the problem that it makes one wonder about the real purpose of the rule. Moreover the rule was first floated in the Spring but the public debate is only now happening in November when most lake residents are elsewhere. The original Warren discussion took place with no prior public notice.

The rule was proposed by the Lake Waramaug Authority which is run by David Robinson's friend Ed Berner. It is hard to learn more about the genesis of the proposal because the Lake Waramaug Authority does not have a web site and does not publish its minutes as far as I can tell. Mr. Berner has stated on more than one occasion in public forums that the motor boat ban must be "all day, every day" because that is the only solution that is acceptable to the DEEP. That is odd and I wonder if it is true. Is it?


The Washington Resident Trooper seemed amenable to a solution in which he simply dropped a buoy with a No Wake flag on crowded days but Mr. Berner quickly shot down this more measured approach as unacceptable to the DEEP. I find this difficult to believe. The "always or never" solution is similar to banning cars from Manhattan's Broadway because it gets really crowded with pedestrians during the Thanksgiving Day parade.

Here is the area of the proposed ban on July 4<sup>th</sup>:

These may be just two pictures taken on the busiest weekends of the year, but they represent more data than has been provided by the proponents of banning jet skis in front of the Robinson property. Number of motor boats

per day, swimmers, kayakers??? Incidents??? I would like to see some facts before any rule is considered. Where is the data?

If the rule is simply a favor to Mr. Robinson then why not be truthful about it. He seems like a nice guy and I believe he has been a friend of the lake. Just "not building houses" on his large lakeside property is worth a medal. Maybe he deserves a reward and some recognition, but let's call it what it is and not move forward under false pretenses. Doing so will only encourage more subterfuge.

Please don't allow the DEEP and the State of Connecticut to be duped.

Dear Mr. Delgado,

I own a home and property on Lake Waramaug and have been a member of the community there for over 50 years. This is my third property ownership in Washington and second property ownership in Washington over the last 10 years with lake frontage. I have been a motor boat, canoe, kayak and sailboat owner as well for much of my experiences on the lake. I currently own a motor boat used for tubing and skiing, a canoe, 2 kayaks and a sailboat. I am writing in regards to the Notice of Intent to Amend the Boating Safety Regulations.

**I am adamantly opposed to this amendment.**

Here is why:

- 1) **There have never been any accidents** on this lake with the current restrictions. Leave them as is.
- 2) There are only 2-3 days per YEAR (generally speaking the July 4<sup>th</sup> weekend and perhaps Labor Day Saturday) where there is any significant boating traffic on the lake where there is any potential danger. I was on the lake in this area 42 days this 2013 summer and have many pictures of this cove with no one on the water or in it. Friends and I water ski in this cove all the time as it has the calmest water - from in front of the state park beach all the way to the opposite cove and back. We have never had any issues with this, especially in the morning and late afternoons. **The cove is totally EMPTY over 98% of the time.**
- 3) **There are already restrictions** for 100' from the shoreline for the 10 miles of Lake Waramaug shoreline. This equates to over 124 ACRES of protected water, where canoeists, kayakers and sailors can enjoy the lake without interference from power boats. These 124 acres equal 18% of the lake's 692 acres already. **So there is NO NEED to increase this restriction** and take away this prime corner of the lake from water skiers, tubers, wakeboarders, etc especially when for 95% of the time,

no one even uses this lake area! Almost 100% of May, June, September and October, we have not seen anyone!

4) If any safety consideration is to be made, it should be for the one weekend each summer when the state park has relatively high usage – July 4<sup>th</sup> weekend. Even this year, we skied on the mornings of July 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> and there were no sail boats, kayaks, or canoes out at all from 7 to 10am or in the early evening hours! **Let's be sensible** about additional restrictions to solve an potential issue that occurs parts of days less than 2% of the time (2 or 3 days out of 180 from May 1 to October 31) and is only a real issue for selected parts of those few days of the entire summer. We ski from May until November!

5) I am sure there are records at the state park that verify that kayak and canoe rental are only significant a few days of the year and only a few hours of those days. **Don't penalize the entire lake motor boating community**, when these non-powered boats (which I won and use as well) already have almost 20% of the lake under restriction, and have such limited 'high usage' – a few hours during midday on a few days per year.

6) I believe **there will be significant financial impact** to the home owners on the lake if this passes. The majority of owners of homes on the lake own motor boats. The value of homes on the lake is driven by these owners' value in utilizing the lake for their boating pleasure. If you reduce the pleasure by further restricting the lake use of motor boats and taking away an even larger portion of the lake, this will reduce the attractiveness of the lake and thus reduce the property values. Reduced property values equals reduced real estate tax income to the town, reduced property transfer fees to the state and reduced income and taxes due to less people being interested in living on a lake with such restrictions.

I am unable to attend the hearing this week, but want to make it clear that **I am adamantly OPPOSED to this amendment.**

**Subject:** Comments on Proposal for a Slow-No-Wake Area on Lake  
Waramaug

Having attended the Public Hearing on the Proposal for a No Wake Speed Zone for Lake Waramaug that took place at the Town Hall in Warren, Connecticut on Friday, November 8, 2013, I am taking this opportunity to submit additional comments.

Based on comments given by both the person who initiated the proposal and others who supported the proposal at the hearing, the reasoning behind this proposal is fundamentally flawed and should be dismissed for the following reasons:

- 1) A wake resulting from a powerboat was never mentioned during the Public Hearing and is therefore not a problem and is not even an issue, yet the person who initiated the proposal is requesting: Slow-No Wake, which is completely unreasonable at 6 mph.
- 2) There are occasional instances where there are increased numbers of hand powered rental craft in the cove that have come primarily from the campgrounds of the state park, which is located on the west shore of the cove. The person who initiated the proposal stated that during these occasional instances that it is an accident waiting to happen. However, the proposal is completely unreasonable in that the proposal completely places all of the burden on the power boater, and none on the operators of the hand powered craft.

Lets draw a parallel with the North Cove and Route 341, which goes right through the center of Warren Connecticut.

What if there were occasional instances where people walking their dogs down the center or within the travel lanes of the roadway on Route 341. That would certainly be an accident waiting to happen. Would the solution be to completely place the burden on the motorist by placing a 6 mph speed limit on motor vehicles for a distance of approximately six football fields? Of course it would not. A six mph speed limit on motor vehicles would not even be considered.

What if there were occasional instances where people jogged and at times jogged while pushing three-wheeled strollers containing a child down the center or within the travel lanes of the roadway on Route 341. That would certainly be an accident

waiting to happen. Would the solution be to completely place the burden on the motorist by placing a 6 mph speed limit for a distance of approximately six football fields? Of course it would not. A six mph speed limit on motor vehicles would not even be considered.

What if there were occasional instances where bicyclists traveled down the center or within the travel lanes of the roadway on Route 341. That would certainly be an accident waiting to happen. Would the solution be to completely place the burden on the motorist by placing a 6 mph speed limit for a distance of approximately six football fields? Of course it would not. A six mph speed limit on motor vehicles would not even be considered.

Everyone who uses a roadway currently shares the burden of responsibility for safety: Motorists, Joggers, Bicyclists, People walking their dogs, and Pedestrians. Everyone who uses a roadway must exercise caution, have an awareness of what is happening around them, and must not put themselves in harms way.

The same is true on the water. Everyone on the water shares the burden of responsibility for safety: Power boaters, Sail Boaters, People operating canoes, People operating kayaks, and swimmers. Everyone who uses the water must exercise caution, have an awareness of what is happening around them, and must not put themselves in harms way. Placing a 6 mph limit on an open water location is madness just as it would be on an open roadway location. The thought of a 6 mph limit on an open roadway would never enter anyone's mind, and the same should be absolutely true for an open waterway.

3) A 6 mph speed limit would be all day, 7 days a week, for the entire year when the lake is not frozen, when the extent of the increased hand powered boat usage is only occasionally.

4) There is already a 6 mph limit to 100 feet from shore, all around the lake. The cove is about 900 feet wide, which leaves 700 feet for the lake speed limit for power boaters. A method must be exercised for hand-powered boaters during those occasional periods of increased hand powered activity.

5) The State Trooper became unprofessional during his second round of comments when he made the situation personal by reacting to the many negative comments regarding the proposal, and subsequently commenting during the Public Hearing that his "reputation" was being "impugned". It was obvious that his comment of his reputation being impugned was made to exert exceptionally undue and completely unwarranted influence on DEEP Personnel. Actually, his comments were being opposed, and rightly so, because this proposal is without merit, and without a doubt the wrong way to solve the situation of occasional increased usage of the cove. Just because a State Trooper supports a proposal, that in no way means that everyone else should automatically fall in line with him, which it seems to me is what he expected. Again, this proposal is the wrong way to solve the situation of occasional increased usage of the cove.

6) A comment in favor of the Proposal was made during the Public Hearing that the amount of lake area covered by the Proposal was, I believe, 4%. This is not in any way a reasonable justification for a 6 mph speed limit. Again comparing it to

motorists traveling on Route 341 through Warren. An attempt to impose a 6 mph speed limit for the length of six football fields on Route 341 through Warren because that length is probably significantly less than one-tenth of one percent ( 0.1 % ) of the length of Route 341, would not be taken seriously, and would not even be considered.

On inland waters, the Slow No Wake, Six mph speed limit is intended for: 1) narrow channels where boats traveling in opposite directions must pass by close to one another, and 2) the water surface area within 100 feet from shore.



In accordance with section 4-168 of the Connecticut General Statutes (CGS) the Commissioner of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) hereby gives notice of his intent to add Section 15-121-B15p to the Regulations of the Connecticut State Agencies to create a slow-no-wake zone in the cove of Lake Waramaug adjacent to Lake Waramaug State Park. This amendment is being proposed under the authority granted to the Commissioner in CGS Section 15-121(b)(11) and pursuant to a vote of the town legislative body and petition of ten or more persons requesting the subject action under CGS Section 15-136.

**Description:** Under this proposal, a Slow-No-Wake zone will be implemented on Lake Waramaug in the northern portion of the cove adjacent to Lake Waramaug State Park, for the purpose of minimizing user conflicts by controlling boat wakes from powerboats in an area frequented by bathers and occupants of manually-propelled vessels.

The proposal of this amendment follows the May 16, 2013 vote of the Town of Warren legislative body and petition of ten or more persons pursuant to CGS Section 15-136(b)(2). There is no anticipated fiscal impact to the municipality or to the State. There is no anticipated adverse impact to small business.

Dear Mr. Delgado,

I am a resident of Washington who has been blessed to live on the shores of Lake Waramaug for the past 29 years. My wife and I have never had a gasoline powered boat; we've used canoes and kayaks, and now we enjoy a battery powered electric boat. During the season we typically have the electric boat out daily, often for a full tour of the lake. In all the time we've been living beside and boating on Lake Waramaug we've never seen an instance where a speeding powerboat threatened kayak or canoe traffic in the proposed no wake/slow zone near the state park. Back in the early 1980's there were instances of large aggressive powerboats threatening all other traffic on the lake; that nuisance was resolved when the only public boat launch on the lake was shut down. Since access to the lake has been controlled the lake has been a very safe boating environment, a fact we attribute largely to the fact that most of the traffic on the lake is from residents of the lake, and one is naturally polite to one's neighbors.

We're aware that many good intentioned people believe that restricting access to the area near the state park is a good idea; but we've yet to hear a reason for that other than 'just because.' We also worry about the unintended consequences of concentrating boat traffic in other parts of the lake. Unless there is some data produced that suggests the existence of a true problem in this area of the lake we believe this is really a case of a solution looking for a problem. The lake has suffered from the implementation of programs born in good intentions but without data or consideration of the unintended consequences in the past. The population of alewives in the lake was originally introduced to attempt to control the algae blooms; then trout had to be introduced to control the alewives, which decimated native populations and fouled the lake and its shorelines with occasional mass deaths. Finally in-lake Layer Aeration systems did the job of controlling the algae blooms, but the alewives remain a reminder of the difficulties of predicting the results of good ideas undertaken without strong data enforcing the need for those policies.

I respectfully suggest that the Department deny the request to implement a no wake zone; if evidence that such a zone is truly needed and would in fact be beneficial to lake safety is developed and introduced at a later time then the Department can act then. In the meantime delaying or denying the requested zone would allow time for such evidence to be developed, if it can be.

Thank you for your consideration and your thoughtful understanding of all sides of this proposal.

I am writing to you regarding the "Slow-No-Wake" zone being proposed for the northern portion of Lake Waramaug adjacent to the state park. I have been a homeowner on the lake since 1998. My wife, Martha, and I as well as our three children (ages 20, 12, and 7) are active water skiers, swimmers, fisherman and kayakers in and on the waters of Lake Waramaug. We support ongoing efforts for to improve boater safety generally, such as a required boater safety license, active police surveillance, as well as limitations on the number of boats permitted on Lake Waramaug. We are also active supporters of the various state- and privately funded entities and initiatives that promote and preserve the Lake Waramaug watershed.

We are strongly opposed to the adoption of the proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone and urge the DEEP to reject the proposal as presented. There is little evidence that would substantiate the need for such a new measure, and a long list of reasons why this proposal is misguided. *First*, Lake Waramaug has historically enjoyed an excellent boater safety record; *Second*, while the proposal will create a protected "special interest" class of users in a specific part of Lake Waramaug, it would also have the effect of compromising the rights of others; *Third*, nearby the proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone there is already a "buffer" area of the watershed that runs the length of the State Park shoreline nearby the proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone which has established buoy markers designating slow wake zone; and, *Finally*, we believe that this proposal may actually *increase* the risk of serious incident elsewhere on the lake by concentrating existing boating activity in a smaller area of the lake.

The stated purpose of the proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone is "for the purpose of minimizing user conflicts by controlling boat wakes from powerboats in an area frequented by bathers and occupants of manually-propelled vessels." The state park represents only one of many such areas on the lake. There are at least two town beaches and two private beaches where swimmers and users of personal watercraft gather in large numbers at times, including one club just south of the proposed restricted area. Are we soon to prohibit motorboats from those waters as well? Should users of personal watercraft be limited to using only "slow-no-wake" zones? That would be an absurdity that would certainly diminish the lake experience for all users.

Watersport enthusiasts have varied interests and needs for enjoying the resources of Lake Waramaug, and while some of these activities are compatible, many of them are frequently not. For example, the calm waters at early morning and sunset on the lake are ideal for swimming, rowing, kayaking, and fishing; and it has been my observation that the motor boaters typically focus their usage to later hours of the day.


Lake Waramaug is a shared resource that should remain open to all approved vessels operating appropriately under established laws and regulations. Unfortunately, boating of any type and lake use generally exposes one to inherent risks. But these risks are lake-wide and not limited to any single area. Users of personal water craft, especially inexperienced users, must also share in the duty and responsibility for safe boating. As you know, Connecticut offers numerous boater safety classes, including classes specifically addressing the operation of kayaks and canoes; some of which are available under DEEP's own website. These are not currently required courses, but perhaps they should be considered as requirements, or at least more actively encouraged for all personal watercraft users -- especially less-experienced users and children who are occasional visitors to the lake.

We appreciate and support the efforts of the various lake-focused entities and law enforcement professionals that have helped make Lake Waramaug a beautiful, safe, and enjoyable lake for my family and all lake users. Clearly, we are all well served by sensible initiatives for greater safety on the lake and share in the responsibility to ensure the welfare of all boaters and other users of the

lake. However, we can't support this specific proposal due to the increased disturbance and risk of injury it will bring to the lake waters near our house and other areas of the lake beyond the waters of the state park where our children and others swim, kayak, canoe, etc. We find little evidence to substantiate the need to "carve out" a specific area of Lake Waramaug for any such limitation that would infringe on the rights of *all* residents to use the lake for their specific boating activities.

If continued safety for *all* users of the lake is the aim (and it should be), it should be achieved through continued vigilance and enforcement of existing laws and regulations, or initiatives which are necessary, balanced, and fair to *all* lake users and property owners, and effective in adding to the safety of *all* lake users. The proposed "Slow-No-Wake" zone would accomplish none of these goals.

With the greatly enlarged area of the slow-no-wake zone under this proposal, the current boating traffic of the lake will be squeezed into a smaller area of the lake. I believe that the balance of safety in these circumstances argues for keeping the existing no-wake zone and not dramatically increasing its size, as proposed in this regulation.

The lake has come a "long way" since the over-crowded boating situation that was prevalent in those days, and we have been supporters of the innovative initiatives to protect the lake quality. We have two young children who are in our waters literally every day of the summer in one fashion or another (via swimming, canoe, motor boating, etc). Their safety and those of others enjoying the lake is of paramount importance to us. While the proposed no-wake zone may provide some additional safety to users of the waters in the state park area, we are concerned that this proposed restriction from motor boat usage on this part of the lake will result in greater density of motor boat usage elsewhere on the lake, creating a more dangerous situation. The State Park is only one of many areas where children and adults swim, kayak and canoe.

We are writing as home owners and tax payers on Lake Waramaug (1 Arrowpoint Rd. in Warren) to express our concerns about the proposed Lake Waramaug Slow No Wake Zone. We are concerned that the new zone will create more traffic and congestion in the other parts of the Lake, and, in doing so, will actually decrease the water craft safety on the Lake, as compared to current safety conditions. There is already a slow zone by the town beach and within a certain distance from the shore. And, boats are required to stay 100 feet apart from each other for safety on the Lake. These rules should suffice, as the Lake is relatively small. By adding the new proposed slow wake zone, additionally, the actually area where boaters can water ski, tube and feel the wind, will become too small in our opinion, causing congestion and with it a greater risk of accidents in the rest of the Lake. Additionally, Having the part of the Lake that abuts the West side of Arrowpoint to turn around near when towing a tuber or a water skier allows one a less congested part of the Lake to make a turn in. It is therefore safer to be able to make turns in this part of the Lake, still plenty of safe distance away from the State Park swimmers or kayakers, than in the main and most congested part of the Lake. The Slow No Wake Zone proposal would limit our ability to turn in this area and therefore also our ability to safely boat, tube and water ski on the Lake, in our opinion.

To our knowledge, in the five years we have been on the Lake, there has never been an accident due to a boat going too fast in the area of the proposed Slow No Wake Zone. Why then make this change and create the possibility of producing a real safety problem in the rest of the Lake by necessitating a higher concentration of skiers, tubers and boaters elsewhere. The only safety concern we have observed on the Lake is that of jet skiers, often who launch at the State Park, coming way too close to swimmers, boaters, kayakers, tubers and water skiers and traveling too fast on the Lake. Regulations aimed at jet ski use on the Lake seems a far better way to ensure better Lake safety.

I am writing to you regarding the “Slow-No-Wake” zone being proposed for the northern portion of Lake Waramaug adjacent to the state park. I have been a homeowner on the lake since 2000, and I was a renter prior to owning since 1996. My wife and I and our four young children (ages 11-13) have been enjoying the lake and its many activities for over a decade now, and consider Lake Waramaug to be one of the most special places in the country.

My wife and I are strongly opposed to the adoption of the proposed “Slow-No-Wake” zone. In my opinion, we do not currently have a safety problem on Lake Waramaug. Of course, I have witnessed examples of careless boating (both motor boating as well as careless kayaking and canoeing), but I do not believe that the evidence would support the kind of changes suggested by this proposal. In fact, I worry that a proposal like this would actually create problems elsewhere. Boater density on a lake is a zero sum game – if you reduce it on one end of the lake, you increase it everywhere else, when you make it safer for some, you make it more dangerous for others. I see neither the need for this change nor the fairness in the proposal when you consider those of us who live elsewhere on the lake.

Finally, Lake Waramaug already has many laws and regulations in effect that have contributed to the excellent record of safety and health of the lake. With respect to rules and regulations, I wouldn't be surprised to find out that Lake Waramaug is already the most regulated lake in Connecticut. Continued enforcement of these laws and regulations by our lake's highly professional and effective law enforcement officers will continue to keep the lake safe and healthy for all who have come to enjoy it.

Dear Mr. Delgado

I am writing to you regarding the no wake zone at the Lake Waramaug State Park. I have been a resident of the lake community since 1996 and am very familiar with the lake, its activities, and more particularly: boat traffic, number of boats, and waterfront activity at the state park. This knowledge is not only as an active user of the lake but in the late 90's I was the author (along with Dave McQuade) of the Heritage Lake Act, which as you know, is the designation given to Lake Waramaug. At that time, the state was planning to construct a boat launch at the park, which would have had a significant negative effect upon the lake. Fortunately the state legislature agreed, passing the proposal into law and the governor named Lake Waramaug Connecticut's first Heritage Lake.

I have reviewed the map of the prosed "no wake zone" and in addition have gone to the state park both on foot and in my boat to understand the proposed boundary line. While I agree with the concept, it is my informed opinion that the zone you propose is too large. As I understand it, the proposed southern line of the zone is 1750 feet from the northern shore of the lake at the state park. This area goes well beyond the buoyed swimming area as well as the location of the canoe rental area where canoes and kayaks are launched. If the line were reduced to 1250 feet these areas would still be protected, accomplishing your objective. It would also:

- Create a larger area for water skiers and tubers to turn their boats around reducing the concentration of activity near the Lake Waramaug Country Club which has a concentration of power boat, canoes and kayaks, and sailboats.
- Those campers who are more experienced actually like the boat wakes and it has been my experience that they wait for me to pass so that they can go through my wake which they apparently enjoy. By reducing the no wake line they can stay near the park and still enjoy an "open water" experience.

In closing I feel compelled to point out that there has not been one incident involving a motorboat and a "people powered" boat of which I am aware. While it is true that there are more boats on the lake than even five years ago, it is not motorboats, but rather "people powered" boats that account for the additional activity. Frankly it is striking how uncongested the lake is. The July 4<sup>th</sup> weekend is likely the height of summer boating activity. It has been my observation that at any one time during this weekend you would be hard pressed to find more than

six motorboats pulling tubes or skiers or traveling at wake creating speeds. While I have great respect for the lake police patrol and their concern that an accident "may happen", it strikes me that the proposal (as so eloquently stated by another lake resident) is a solution looking for a problem. As stated above, I support the idea of a "no wake" zone, but encourage you to reduce its size for the benefit of all lake users.






